We are commanded to mark them and avoid them that are contrary to the doctrine. We cannot have fellowship with those who walk in darkness. > Another principle we need to recognize is the fact that God never approves of conversions by compromise. Rather than compromising and saying, "If you attend our meeting, we will attend yours," the Bible says, "Contend earnestly for the faith ...," (Jude 3). Not once in the New Testament do we have any example of any New Testament Christian compromising in such a way with God's approval. You simply cannot compromise and contend at the same time. If someone attends our meeting and obeys the gospel as a result of hearing the Word of God, it is not because you compromised and attended with them so that they would attend with you; but, it is in spite of your compromise. God's Word is the power to save a soul (Romans 1:16; John 8:32; James 1:21). Compromise has never won a soul to Christ. Rather than compromise winning non-Christians to Christ, the Holy Spirit says it is the manner of life that the Christian lives (1 Peter 3:1-2).

If we want to make heaven our home, we need to think not open to everyone without limitations or restriction. The like God thinks and do those things the way God wants! •

### "How Valuable Is The Kingdom?" By Jarrod Jacobs

We are aware of the fact that Jesus used parables as a kingdon primary means of teaching when He was on earth. This was not an arbitrary decision. Rather, Jesus spoke in parables so that He might fulfill Old Testament prophecy. (Matt. 13:34-35). The primary purpose or focus in these parables was the coming kingdom. Jesus therefore, spent time preparing those following Him for the kingdom that was "at hand" or near (Mk. 1:14-15). Two parables recorded in Matthew 13 show us just how valuable the kingdom is to Christ and ought to be to us.

Jesus said, "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which a man found and covered up. Then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field. Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls, who, on finding one pearl of great value, went and sold all he had and bought it" (Matt. **13:44-46**, ESV). Notice the similarities in these parables. 1) In both parables, we find men who are willing to sell all they possessed in order to obtain that which they did not have. 2) Both men could see the value in the items purchased (treasure/pearl), and realized that what they sacrificed in order to purchase the items would be worth it. Though the men found their items in different ways, and though the initial motive in each case was different; the response was the same when the item was discovered. The men sacrificed everything in order to obtain the possessions.

Now, please remember the focus of the parable. It was not instruction on how to buy land or how to buy pearls. Rather, it was to show men the true value of the kingdom of God! The kingdom was worth the sacrifice of everything in order to obtain it. Friend, what is our estimation of the Lord's kingdom? Unlike Christ who preached the kingdom was "at hand" or near (Mk. 1:14-15), we today preach the truth that the kingdom of God exists and is present among men (Col. 1:13, 4:11; Rom. 14:17; Acts 14:22, 8:12; etc.)!

Now, what value do we place upon the kingdom? In the parables, Jesus said belonging to the kingdom meant sacrificing all in order to obtain this relationship. Yet, what value do we place upon it? Am I willing to sacrifice:

- Family relations in order to be in the kingdom? Jesus said, "Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me, and whoever loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me" (Matt. 10:37).
  - What I consider "important" in order to be in the kingdom? Can we agree with what the apostle Paul wrote? "But whatever gain I had, I counted as loss for the sake of Christ. Indeed, I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things and count them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ" (Phil. 3:7-8). Can we agree with what Jesus said and "cut off" even those things closest to us if it means eternity with Him and avoiding Hell (Matt. 5:29-30. 18:8)?
- "Possessions in order to be in the kingdom? "But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness and all these things (the things mentioned in v. 25, 28, 31, JJ) will be added to you" (Matt. 6:33). Look again at the parables in Matthew 13:44-46. These men willingly sold ALL THEY HAD in order to obtain the one thing that was of the greatest importance! What would we do?

What are we willing to sacrifice? Do we say, "This far, and no further" when it comes to sacrifices for the Lord (I Pet. 2:5)? Are we only willing to sacrifice the things we are willing to give up anyway? Are we like the Jews in Malachi who gave the Lord the blind, lame, and sick for "sacrifices" (Mal. 1:8)? How we need to have the attitude of David who said, "I will not offer burnt offerings to the Lord my God that cost me nothing" (II Sam. 24:24). Some may think this attitude is "crazy", or that I am being a "fanatic." Let them contend with the Lord on this matter, for it is His word we speak.

How much value do we place upon the Lord's kingdom? The answer to this question influences future decisions we make as children of God. Let us place the same value upon the kingdom that Christ did. In so doing, we

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will be focusing on the right things and preparing our souls
