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DOES BAPTISM "SANCTIFY" A SINFUL RELATIONSHIP? By Jimmy Pettigrew

It is said by some that since baptism washes away all baptism - so those involved in adulterous marriages (those which violate **Matthew 19:9**) do not have to separate after the doctrinal and moral purity of the church.

What they are saying then is that non-Christians are simply not under (amenable to) the law (gospel) of Christ. Marriages involving only non-Christians are acceptable to God even if they violate Matthew 19:9 because non-Christians are not under the law of Christ.

In Matthew 19:5 we learn that marriage was not just for Adam and Eve, but it is for all mankind, " ... For this cause shall a man leave father and mother, and shall cleave to his wife: and they twain shall be one flesh." Surely no one contends this was for Adam and Eve only, as they had neither father nor mother. Now, since we have all mankind involved in marriage, it is crystal clear that marriage is not an institution limited to the church or covenant, limited to Christians only. Marriage antedates the church and the nation.

Does the covenant of God apply to all men? The Biblical answer to this question is "YES." The Lord commissioned his apostles to teach "all nations" (Matthew 28:19- -13); baptism is into newness of life (Romans 6:3-5); it 20), "unto the uttermost part of the earth" (Acts 1:8), and frees one from sin (Romans 6:17-18). But baptism will not "to preach the word to the whole creation" (Mark 16:15- remove temptation, nor does it guarantee eternal life and 16). Christ will judge all men by His words (John 5:22, 27; will not change a sinful practice into a righteous one or **12:48).** The commands to repent and be baptized are in change a sinful relationship into a righteous one! the covenant of Christ (Acts 2:28; Mark 16:15-16). They are not addressed to Christians but to the alien sinners. Therefore, all men are accountable to the covenant of remarriage. I would be a false teacher if I tried to justify Christ.

Some might ask, "Doesn't baptism take away all sin?" sins, it sanctifies marriages which existed at the time of The Biblically correct answer to that question is "NO!" Baptism will not forgive a sin known to an individual which is yet un-repented. Repentance demands that one sever all baptism. This is a false teaching which jeopardizes both relationships which violate the will of God. Faith in Jesus Christ must precede baptism (Mark 16:16), and baptism without prior faith is of no value; repentance must also precede baptism (Acts 2:38), and baptism without prior repentance of every known sin is useless.

> If a man makes it clear that he does not intend to repent of his sinful situation, he cannot be scripturally baptized! He would get wet! The notion that baptism somehow sanctifies an unholy relationship so as to turn adultery into marriage is preposterous. Baptism is not some sort of magic which performs marriage ceremonies for adulterers!

> If one can keep on committing adultery after being baptized then one can keep on committing murder after being baptized. If not, why not? Baptism does many things: baptism puts one into Jesus Christ (Galatians 3:26-27); it is into the death of Christ (Romans 6:3-4); it saves one from sin (Mark 16:16; 1 Peter 3:21); it brings remission of sins (Acts 2:37-38); baptism washes away sins (Acts 22:16); it inducts one into the body, the church (1 Corinthians 12:12

and its permanency. Pat Robertson, host of "The 700 Club," has emerged to said that a person whose spouse has Alzheimer's disease could divorce the ailing spouse and find someone else. This statement was broadcast on his television show on Tuesday. September 13, 2011. He included the caveat that the divorcing spouse ought to provide for "custodial care" for the ill spouse, but otherwise, the person, according to Robertson, would be justified in divorcing the spouse and marrying another.

Robertson's co-host on the show asked him such guestions as: "What about 'for better or for worse?' and, 'in sickness and in health'?" She went on to say, "If you respect that vow, you say `til death do us part'." Robertson's response was: "This is a kind of death." According to Robertson, since the ailing person is enduring a "kind of death" in losing cognitive function, then this justifies the healthier person's decision to divorce and find a similarly healthy mate! How horrible! In addition to Robertson's statement being completely anti-Scriptural (Matt. 5:32, 19:9; Rom. 7:2-3; etc.), it is also unethical, reprehensible, irresponsible, and just down-right mean to entertain thoughts that when a spouse gets "too sick", then the healthy spouse would have God's sanction to divorce and find someone else!

Based on Robertson's reasoning, wouldn't the person who has a spouse dying of terminal cancer also be justified in divorcing and marrying someone healthier? So long as "custodial care" was provided, of course! After all, the ravages one suffers as terminal cancer spreads through the body is a "kind of death," too! What about lung diseases, heart diseases, bone diseases, etc.? Actually, once we are born we begin to die (Gen. 3:17-19; Ecc. 9:5; Heb. 9:27; Ecc. 12:7). Therefore, are we not all suffering a "kind of death" as we move toward our "eternal home" daily (Ecc. 12:5)? Based upon Pat's reasoning, I wonder why Mrs. Robertson would want to stay married to Pat at all when she can simply provide for his "custodial care" and find a healthier spouse?

I am glad to see many in our country outraged by Robertson's words. - "Then the LORD God said, "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper fit for him So the LORD God caused a deep sleep to fall upon the man, and while he slept took one of his ribs and closed up its place with flesh. And the rib that the LORD God had taken from the man he made into a woman and brought her to the man. Then the man said, "This at last is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; she shall be called Woman, because she was taken out of Man. Therefore a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and they shall become one flesh" (Gen. 2:18-24).
- "And Pharisees came up to him and tested him by asking, 'Is it lawful to divorce one's wife for any cause?' He answered, 'Have you not read that he who created them from the beginning made them male and female, and said, 'Therefore a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh? So they are no longer two but one flesh. What therefore God has joined together, let not man separate'" (Matt. 19:3-6; Mk. 10:7-9).
- "For a married woman is bound by law to her husband while he lives, but if her husband dies she is released from the law of marriage. Accordingly, she will be called an adulteress if she lives with another man while her husband is alive. But if her husband dies, she is free from that law, and if she marries another man she is not an adulteress" (Rom. 7:2-3).

A cursory reading of these texts shows us that God's will for marriage and Pat Robertson's will are diametrically opposed! In truth, when hard times come to a marriage (and they will), THIS is the time that we ought to turn to God and lean upon Him all the more (I Pet. 5:7)!
