Instrumental music in worship. For many, this is the only difference that is recognized between the Independent Christian faith and the Lord's church. Too many of the members of the Independent Christian faith believe it is a matter of indifference, a matter of opinion, and that one can worship with it or without it and be equally acceptable before God.

When one turns to the Bible, he sees that every reference to Christian worship authorizes Christians to sing (Ephesians 5:19: Colossians 3:16), with NO reference to playing of an instrument. Where does God's Word, expressed in the New Testament, advocate the use of mechanical instruments in worship? Not anywhere! Instrumental music in Christian worship is vain worship because it originated with man, not with God. By using instrumental music in worship, one rejects God's authority and is not alism that Jesus in now sitting on David's throne - not in adhering to the doctrine of Christ.

There is not anything wrong with instrumental music as a God-given art or science. Within itself it is not a matter of morals, of right or wrong. It is just like eating ham and eggs are not moral issue. However, eating ham and eggs would become a sin if performed as an act of worship in the Lord's Supper, because the law of Christ allows only the kind of food that He specified and that is bread and the fruit of the vine. It would also be like bathing or sprinkling water on a baby would be morally right, but do so as a religious act, calling it baptism would become a sin because it has no authorization by Christ; He did not command it. There is no more authority to add instrumental music as a part of Christian worship than it would be to put jelly on the bread at the Lord's Table. > Members of the Independent Christian faith hold to the false teaching of Premillennialism. They are unable to see any problem in holding to such a teaching that makes the church of our Lord simply an after-thought in the mind of God. Premillennialism teaches that the kingdom was postponed because Christ was rejected as King, and as a result, the church was substituted until He shall return to establish His kingdom. The Bible teaches that the church was not an after-thought, but rather was in God's eternal purpose (Ephesians 3:10-11). Then Paul said, "Who hath delivered us from the power of darkness, and hath translated us into the kingdom of his dear Son" (Colossians **1:13**). John joins in the refutation of premillennialism by reminding all that he was in the kingdom while exiled on the isle of Patmos (Revelation 1:9). "If there was no kingdom, where was I?" asks John. Peter informs premillenni-Jerusalem, but in heaven (Acts 2:30-36)! If one has a throne, he certainly has a kingdom! Therefore, to say that the kingdom has not been established is to oppose the very Word of God!

> There are a number among the leadership of the Independent Christian faith who accepts any immersion, without it being for the remission of sins. From a letter from a preacher of the Christian faith responding to an inquiry about his position on baptism, "I do not teach that baptism is a necessity for the remission of sins " "My own stand on baptism is that... it is an outward expression of inward change . . . that it is not necessary for salvation, for forgiveness of sins, nor is it necessary to receive the Holy Spirit." Truth is something that demands a response. Every tragedy to see people who think the Bible is nothing more time we are faced with the truth of God's word (Jn. 17:17). than "myths" or "stories." Is this your attitude? we must do something with it. I imagine no better example could be given of the various responses man has to the truth than in the events recorded in Acts 17 when Paul preached at Mars Hill. Let us study the book of **Acts 17**, and ask what ourselves what we will do when we hear the truth. When you hear the truth...

Do You Consider It Babbling?

When Paul entered Athens and saw all the idols in that town, "his spirit was provoked within him as he saw that the city was full of idols. So he reasoned in the synagogue with the Jews, and with the devout persons, and in the 32). marketplace every day with those who happened to be there" (Acts 17:16-17). When the Epicureans and the Stoics heard Paul, they asked, "What does this babbler wish to say?" (Acts 17:18). A "babbler" literally was a man. "lounging about the marketplace and picking up a subsistence by whatever may chance to fall from the merchandise; a parasite; getting a living by flattery or buffoonery; an empty talker" (Thaver's, p. 584). These Athenians looked to Paul and thought he was some kind of fool, a bum, or someone simply speaking for entertainment purposes. That is why there was so much interest in him at first. "All the Athenians and the foreigners who lived there would spend their time in nothing except telling or hearing something new" (Acts 17:19-21).

The world at large considers the truth of God nothing more than foolishness. Paul wrote, "For the word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of ther discerning I will thwart. Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of this world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God by wisdom, it pleased God through the folly of what we preach to save those who believe" (I Cor. 1:18-21). It is a

Do You Mock When The Truth Is Preached?

In Acts 17:22-31, we read the most profound treatise on God from the creation to the second coming. When the Athenians heard this sermon, "some mocked" (Acts 17:32). The implication from this passage is that they mocked so much that Paul stopped preaching (McGarvey, Original Commentary on Acts, p. 223-224)! These people spent all their time either hearing or telling some new thing, but when it came to listening to the Truth, they could not bear it, and mocked the preacher (Acts 17:21,

Are you one who would mock God's word? First, let us define what it means to mock as they did. To mock at God's word is to, "to jest, jeer at" (Vine's, p. 528). Mr. Thayer adds the word "deride" to his definition (p. 669). After we hear someone preach, do we say, "That is just his opinion," or "He gets paid to say that. If he didn't say that we would fire him"? When we say things like this about the Bible and those who proclaim the truth, we are mocking at the truth as they did in Paul's day, and that is sinful.

Do You Want To Hear It Again?

Some who heard Paul speak about the resurrection said, "We will hear you again about this" (Acts 17:32). This was not something negative, but it was something hopeful. Some wanted to hear more about God and the resurrection.

I am afraid that people forget that the command to hear God's words is just as binding as the command to preach! God commands us to "hear" Jesus (Matt. 17:5). When Peter preached on Pentecost, he told the people to "hear these words" (Acts 2:22). While Jesus was upon this earth, He said, "My sheep hear my voice" (Jn. 10:27). further punishment of a crime" (Webster's). What man needs, and what God provides, is pardon. We have suffered enough for our sins. We want to be released from free to choose HOW to be saved. There is a truth that further punishment. We seek eternal life with God and Christ. The Bible is the best selling book of all time because it contains the message of pardon, or the forgiveness of sins. Man's greatest need-salvation-is found in the Bible.

God is able to forgive us of our sins because of the shed blood of His Son Jesus Christ (Matt. 26:28; Eph. 1:7). But the fact that the blood has been shed does not mean that everyone is automatically forgiven. We chose to sin, resulting in our being lost. We must also choose to be saved. God has made a way for us to be forgiven, and this way can be referred to as a law of pardon.

God is not going to save us on the merit of our goodness. Cornelius is a great example of this (Acts 10). Cornelius was "a devout man and one who feared God with all his household, who gave alms generously to the people,

> What has Jesus said we must do to be saved? Believe! "Therefore I said to you that you will die in your sins; for if you do not believe that I am He, you will die in your sins" (John 8:24). Repent of Our Sins! "I tell you, no; but unless you repent you will all likewise perish" (Luke 13:3). Confess Faith in Christ! "Therefore whoever confesses Me before men, him I will also confess before My Father who is in heaven. But whoever denies Me before men, him I will also deny before My Father who is in heaven" (Matt. 10:32-33). Be Baptized! "He who believes and is baptized

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will be saved; but he who does not believe will be condemned" (Mark 16:16).

Anything other than, or short of, what Jesus says is not the truth. It is through obedience to the gospel that we enter into Christ (Gal. 3:26-27) and enjoy every spiritual blessing in Him (Eph. 1:3-14).

We do not become perfect when we become a Christian. Even the most sincere Christians sin from time to time. Unforgiven sins have the same effect on Christians that they do on alien sinners—spiritual death, eternal Hell. So, the question of how Christians receive the forgiveness forgiveness. God must hear from us that we desire to be of their sins is also very important.

We Must Confess Our Sins! "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9). Confession is good for the soul. Our forgiveness is dependant upon our willingness to own up to the fact that we have sinned. God must see in us a heart like that of David who confessed, "I Christian, the blood of Jesus will cleanse you of your sins if have sinned against the Lord" (2 Sam. 12:13).

taking the gospel to those in Samaria. Among those who were converted was one identified as Simon the sorcerer (vs. 9-13). He sinned by trying to buy the ability to dispense the gifts of the Holy Spirit for his own personal gain (vs. 18-19).
