"Thoughts Following The Bombing" **By Jarrod Jacobs**

On Monday, 4/15/13, folks near the finish line of the Any one of us could have been the ones forced to endure Boston marathon suffered a great tragedy when two pain and injury, or be among the families of those who are bombs exploded on the sidewalk. My understanding is suffering, What can I learn from this event? One thing I am that 4 people have been killed since Monday, and nearly reminded of is when Christ referred to two events in Luke 150 people have been injured in some manner. As more 13:1-5 where people suffered and died. In both cases details emerge, we need to pray for the families affected, for the injured people, and for the doctors and nurses who are caring for the injured at this time. Some people will be coping and living with the consequences of this event for many years.

We Know Who Was Really Responsible.

As I thought about these events and their consequences, my mind went to the source of what was behind it. What could cause people to want to commit such violence? The overwhelming majority of people attending the race were no doubt strangers to one another, as well as strangers to the bombers. Why would they want to commit this violence? While we may never fully know the reasons, I realized that we already know who ultimately was behind such an act — Satan!!

Satan tempted these people to commit such destruction, and they yielded to that temptation (Jas. 1:14-15; I Jn. 2:15-17). If we never know all the "whys" behind the bombings, we do know this! We know that Satan tempts man in this way because he is our enemy (I Pet. 5:8). He hates mankind and wants men to turn against each other. He is an enemy of love, of truth, and of right (Matt. 13:25-39). He wants confusion, and not peace (unlike God, I Cor. 14:33). He has been a murderer and a liar from the beginning (Jn. 8:44), and the murder and mayhem on that Monday is just more proof of it! Therefore, we need to remember that in this life, it is Christ who has given us the opportunity to be saved (Rom. 1:16). He loves us, and wants us safe. Christ is our true friend (Jn. 15:13)! Satan is our enemy!

Life Is Uncertain.

As I thought about the bombing, my thoughts also turned to the people who were hurt. While the bombing was intentional, the people hurt were random victims. Had been among the number of injured or dead (Ecc. 9:11-12).

(some folks Pilate had killed, and some folks killed by a wall falling on them), Jesus asked those listening: "Do you think they were worse offenders than all the others ...?" The answer was "No!" Their transgressions were not "worse" than others, even though they died at that point. Jesus then tells the crowd (and us), "Except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish" (Lk. 13:3, 5)!

What I learn from the Boston bombing is that I need to make my life right with God while I can! We have no promise of tomorrow (Prov. 27:1). We have no guarantees! Making plans for the future is a good thing to do (Jas. 4:15). However, tomorrow is still in the hands of God, and not ours! Therefore, let us not put off doing what we know we need to do (Heb. 3:7-8; Mk. 16:16)! I notice in the Bible that when folks knew what they needed to do to be saved, they went right then and did it (Acts 2:41, 8:36-38, 16:30-34. 22:16)! This is but more evidence of the fact that we do not know what will be tomorrow. Therefore, take advantage of our opportunities to serve and please God while we still can!

As of this writing, I know there are at least 4 people who can make no more choices! Their bodies are at rest, and their voices are silent! All decisions they wanted to make, and all plans they had will now go undone! Friend, how long will it be before you or I are in that situation? (Job 14:1-2) Listen, do not let your children nor any other family member follow your casket to your grave with them knowing that you put off becoming a Christian!! Your family will miss you when you are gone. Don't let them grieve at your passing as those who have no hope (contr. I Thess. 4:13)!!

This Life Is Not All There Is!

A final thought that went through my mind as I saw the horror and the aftermath of the bombing is that I was happy to know that this world is "not my home"! As the circumstances been different, any one of us could have years pass, I long more and more for "that city which hath

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foundations whose builder and maker is God" (Heb. 11:10). This world will continue to get worse and worse because men have decided to direct their own steps (Jer. **10:23).** As this continues. Christians will understand what Paul meant when he said, "My desire is to depart and be with Christ, for that is far better" (Phil. 1:23). That is the truth! Bombings, violence, wickedness, and similar things are not from God, but are from Satan.

Conclusion

Seeing that bombings, mayhem, wickedness, and the like are not likely to end soon (II Tim. 3:13), what can we do? Are we powerless against such actions? By no means! "God gave us a spirit not of fear but of power and love and self-control" (II Tim. 1:7). We have power, for we have the

gospel of Christ at our fingertips (Rom. 1:16). The gospel is God's power to save and to change the hearts of men.

Think about where you were before you became a

Christian (Acts 22:16). Do you want to go back to that life again? I don't either. Therefore, let us take this gospel, this life-changing message, and tell others about it. When we do this, then the world can truly change for the better. Change does not come at the point of a spear or the muzzle of a gun. Change comes when the hearts of men repent and turn back to the Lord (II Pet. 3:9)! Truly, "the weapons of our warfare are not of the flesh but have divine power to destroy strongholds. The truth is that such no more fits the Biblical use of the word fellowship than sprinkling or pouring fit the Biblical use of baptism. Neither do such activities conform to what former gospel preachers have taught us about the work of the church. The late B. C. Goodpasture, who edited the Gospel Advocate for years, in answering a question about the work of the church, said: "This question can be answered both negatively and positively. It is not the mission of the church to furnish amusement for the world. or even for its members. For the church to turn aside from its divine work to furnish amusement and recreation is to pervert its mission. If the church will discharge its duty in preaching the gospel, in edifying its members, and helping the worthy poor, it will not have desire or the time to amuse or entertain" (Gospel Advocate, pg. 484, 1948).

Former gospel preachers taught us that it was the duty of the home, not the church, to provide recreational activities. I believe that, not just because preachers such as Hardeman, Goodpasture, Lyles, Boles, etc. taught it, but of God? because it is what the Bible teaches (1 Cor. 11:22, 34). Don't be fooled into thinking that Paul is merely dealing with an abuse of the Lord's supper. He is pointing out that ways to be like nations about her (Jer. 2:32-37).
